Secretary's Message

Dear Members,

At this critical juncture when we find ourselves at odds with this unprecedented global health crisis in over a century, I would like to notify two important developments in these rather unusual circumstances, which may be of interest and help to you in the clinical setting.

As mankind continues to grapple with the escalating situation of COVID-19 and hopes of the society stay pinned up to our fraternity on an unprecedented scale, the expectations and stakes are high-as is always the case in cardiothoracic surgery.

Yet, what has changed this time is the rapid development of this pandemic and the inflection it continues to show before man can trace or predict its course. Data and



information have become vital in making decisions-more so in the operating room and intensive care where the atmosphere to perform flawlessly has the added burden of determining the COVID-status of the patient every step along the way.

By an initiative of the Executive Committee, the IACTS COVID-19 Task Force was formed under the leadership of President Dr. Bashi V. Velayudhan. Members of this task-force included Drs. K.S Iyer, Z.S Meharwal, O.P Yadava & C.S Hiremath.

Among its mandate in helping mitigate through the present scenario and re-establish practice in the "new setting" was to establish a stare decisis for units across the country to adopt and incorporate. The official IACTS Guidelines were authored and have now been published through a stringent peer-review process in the IJTC with the primary intent of helping CTVS units across the country deal with clinical enigma and challenges that may be associated with COVID-19 with more clarity and evidence. This document is intended to serve as a guide or a template for units to modify and use suitably in exercising clinical care of patients with cardiovascular, vascular and thoracic disease.

Needless to say, you will find that the document is comprehensive, and that the authors have tried to cover all aspects of cardiothoracic surgery that have been convoluted by the coronavirus pandemic.



Editor's Musings

Friends,

Its time yet again for a Pow Wow.

Thanks for all your congratulatory messages on IJTC being indexed by PubMed Central. Sure enough they warm our cockles and inspire us to go for more. Equally, felicitations are due to all of you—the reviewers, authors and raison d'etre of our very existence, our readers. Lest I fail in my duty, I appreciate the dedication of our Associate Editors and can't thank enough the Editorial Board members, for guiding us like a beacon. Last post is reserved for salutations to the esteemed former Editors, for laying a strong foundation, for us to carry forward.



Darting a little askew, our rejection rate of the manuscripts has gone up. Its not that all the papers that were rejected were of a poor quality, to the very contrary, a number of them had scientific material of substance, but unfortunately had not been packaged well. Hence, I thought of communicating with you.

The common causes of rejection of manuscripts in our experience have been:

- 1. **Not in scope of the journal** probably not relevant to this readership.
- 2. **Not conforming to the norms of IJTC** Please read 'Instructions to the Authors' very carefully. The manuscript should be structured on IMRaD (Introduction, Methods, Results, Discussion) format and references must follow Vancouver style. All details are available on our manuscript submission portal www.editorialmanager.com/ijtc.
- 3. **Poor Language** Commonest mistake here is non-uniformity of tense (e.g. writing one line in present and another in past tense). Others are using complex sentences, flowery language and euphemisms, which may be appreciated in English literature, but not in scientific writing. One should construct short sentences and convey one idea per sentence. Always try and keep the verb and subject together.
- 4. **Grammatical mistakes** Incorrect use of upper and lower case in text, comma & full stop.
- 5. **Poor methodology** The primary and secondary end points, inclusion and exclusion criteria, and aims and objectives of the study are either not pre-specified or not defined with clarity. In fact, at times they may be missing altogether!



- 6. **Statistical analysis inadequate** The logic behind the calculation of the sample size is not brought out clearly and the power of the study is not worked with due diligence so that the study may be underpowered in reference to a specific end-point. Even the statistical tools used may be inappropriate.
- 7. **Review of literature archaic** Authors should do an exhaustive literature search and present contemporary data.
- 8. **Improper use of acronyms** At first usage, full expansion of common and oft repeated terms should be used and paraphrased by an acronym. Thereafter only the acronym should be used and not the full form.
- 9. **Citation of references** They should be in square brackets and always in ascending order i.e. in order of their appearance in text.
- 10. **Limitations** Not listed out in details.
- 11. **Conclusions** Not borne out of the study.

Always try to bring out what's new in the manuscript that it adds to the existing literature. A 'Take Home' message, if worthy, increases the chances of the manuscript getting published.

Wishing you an enhancing and rewarding publishing experience with IJTC.

66th Annual Conference of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons

Ahmedabad, Gujarat February 6th-9th 2020




The 66th Annual Conference of our Association was held at the resplendent city of Ahmedabad in the western state of Gujarat between the 6th and 9th of Februrary this summer.

The conclave was themed on integrating innovations with innate skills to lay emphasis on the evolution of education in the midst of evolving technology and techniques in our profession. This was part of an initiative to give an impetus to skill-based learning with functional understanding of techniques, aided by the use of seamless cutting-edge technology for the perfection of technique and delivery of prudent

healthcare services in the specialties of cardiac, thoracic and peripheral vascular surgery.

This enterprising event had in store multiple avenues for discussion, deliberation and dissemination of the approaches, management and training in CT Surgery. Innovative training and teaching modules for residents, panel discussions on standards and controversies, wet labs, learning modules with doyens, scientific presentations, landmark memorial orations, research and development exhibits and much more, await to involve anyone with the interest of furthering care, research and the fundamental-advanced practices of cardiothoracic surgery across the global spectrum.



66th Annual General Body




The 66th Annual General Body was held on the evening of February 7th 2020 under the Chairmanship of the 50th President.

Pillai Member This is to inform the General Body of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons vide this communication of a collective resolution (Ref: OS/WF/ 072031/1) of the Executive Committee of the Association in matters of dispute w.r.t. the election of Executive Committee Members(Two Positions) during the proceedings of the 66th Annual General Body Meeting held on February 7, 2020 in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, on the sidelines of the 66th Annual Conference of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons.

The following facts are to be established on record.,

- 1. A senior member of the General Body raised objections to the candidature of a nominee at the conclusion of the election based on a prior constitutional amendment. At this point of time the majority of the general body had dispersed and initiating an alternate solution in the form of a re-election was not possible since less than 1/3rd of the quorum was present in the hall. The result was therefore announced based on the validity of the objection that was raised and considered constitutionally valid.
- 2. The nominee whose application was in question, had agreed to abide by (either) outcome of the election, as deemed appropriate by the General Body and the Returning Officer. However, a group of members approached the Executive Committee at the conclusion of the election citing impropriety and unfairness in the manner in which the issue was handled and the result was announced.
- 3. The Executive Committee admits to an oversight in the screening process of the application of the concerned member due to an inconsistency in records (Art. 13, Constitution) sought to detail the plan of action for such a scenario.

The Executive Committee notes that this situation is unparalleled without any precedence and believes in respecting the opinion and suggestions of all members of the fraternity. It wishes to offer an unconditional apology to all nominees for the uncertainty and degree of anxiety it may have created over the course of this time.

After reviewing this situation from all perspectives – constitutional and logical and in an effort to maintain impartiality and respect the opinions of all stakeholders, the Executive Committee (in accordance with Art.3 of the Bylaws of the Association) has arrived at the decision to retro-actively nullify the election for the two positions in question. All candidates on the said ballot shall have the liberty to contest for the said position in the subsequent general body election, alongside any fresh candidates for four positions that shall serve for a term between 2021-2024.

This is for the kind notification and attention of all Fellows & Life Members of the Association.

IACTS SCORE 2020

IACTS SCORE was a two-day orientation program designed for students pursuing residency in cardiothoracic surgery. This is a national effort aimed at acquainting residents about the knowhows of examination patterns, tips and tricks to fare well in the evaluation of their knowledge, skills & competence. It is a national effort of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons for the benefit of residents that has been designed with a feedback channel with a platform for students to undergo a mock examination, evaluate themselves, clear any conceptual lacunae with the help of faculty & peers and gauge their competence to appear for the examination.

The fourth recension of IACTS SCORE saw over 170 residents in attendance who participated in a wembley of sessions that included case presentations in cyanotic, acyanotic congenital groups, valvular etiology, thoracic etiology and redo surgical case.

Eminent teachers engaged classes on the fundamentals of catheterisation, ECG and interpretation of numerous imaging modalities including X-Rays, Echocardiography, Computed Tomography and Cardiac Magnetic Resonance from the purview of preoperative and postoperative





evaluation of patients. Based on feedback and requests, special sessions covering valve technology, historical advances in cardiothoracic surgery, biostatistics, recent clinical trials and interpretation of thoracic imaging were convened. Interactive didactic forums on conduct of cardiopulmonary bypass, mechanical circulatory support and instrumentation were organised.

Professor Balram Airan, an authority in the practice of cardiothoracic surgery who has created a niche for himself in the areas of complex corrections for congenital malformations and academic administration was the keynote faculty this year.

Dr. Bashi V. Velayudhan and Dr. Sathyaki P. Nambala, recognised experts in the fields of aortic and minimally invasive surgeries, respectively, shared their experiences on the basics of practice in the novel masterclass sessions.

This year, a team of exam-going residents in groups of 3 were given the unique opportunity to prepare, evaluate and present cases in the mock examination rounds, where overall performance was evaluated to great detail and conveyed to candidates to identify and improve their efforts in the direction to excel in the examination as a precinct to the longer journey of an academic surgeon.

Experienced faculty including Dr. Anil Tendolkar, Dr. Balram Airan, Dr. Seetharama Bhat, Dr. Shekhar Rao presided over the congenital sessions, amidst Dr. Vinayak Shukla, Dr. Prasanna Simha and Dr. Neelam B. Desai who guided the students in adult and redo case presentations, while Dr. Srikrishna S.V, Dr. S. Sosale and Dr. Shivakumara Swamy T.S rendered their insights on thoracic lesions.

For the first time in CME history, IACTS SCORE went live online for the benefit of residents who could not make it to the event.



The families of many of these moral-bearers have lost a dear one and so have we-the scientific community witnessed the loss of hardworking and sincere colleagues who selflessly sacrificed their lives in the line of duty.

The cardiothoracic fraternity has been no different. Given the extremity of presentation across age groups, we were left with little choice to resume work, trying to assimilate what time and best precautions and protective resources we could find to get back and serve our patients. We have lost many colleagues and co-workers in this endeavor where the patient comes first.

As we pay homage to the numerous physicians, nurses, paramedical staff and sanitary workers who did not flinch before the welfare of patients, one can remember this sonnet by Walterrean Salley to eulogise their colleagues:

Fallen warriors, gone too soon
The best, the brave-bold and bright.
Like a comet thrust from the skies
On a late-summertime night.
Men and women who'd taken up the causeGiving no less than their all.
Thirty-one brilliant, eager minds

For whom we silently pause.
In behalf of their motherland
They've paid the ultimate price.
We acknowledge now their families
In memories of their sacrifice.
And of their story, time will tell.
For they shall be remembered well.



Practice of CTVS in COVID-19 era

The Executive Committee of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons constituted a Task Force under the leadership of the President Dr. Bashi V. Velayudhan.

Members of this COVID-19 Task Force included Senior Vice President Dr. K.S Iyer, Junior Vice President Dr. Z.S Meharwal, Editor-in-Chief Dr. O.P Yadava and Secretary Dr. C.S Hiremath.

Among its mandate in helping mitigate through the present scenario and re-establish practice in the "new setting" was to establish a stare decisis for units across the country to adopt and incorporate. The official IACTS Guidelines were authored and have now been published through a stringent peerreview process in the IJTC with the primary intent of helping CTVS units across the country deal with clinical enigma and challenges that may be associated with COVID-19 with more clarity and evidence. This document is intended to serve as a guide or a template for units to modify and use suitably in exercising clinical care of patients with cardiovascular, vascular and thoracic disease.




IACTS MASTERCLASS: The next frontier in cardiothoracic education

The program is an ongoing process, and has benefited the entire fraternity of cardiothoracic surgeons across the ranks of leadership, from professors, senior consultants to associates, junior associates and traineefellows, aside residents.

The MASTERCLASS series covered a host of topics that summed up to:



This web-series has also benefited numerous other professionals from lines of work that include (but not limited to) cardiologists, radiologists, anaesthesiologists, critical-care specialists, paramedical staff including nursing, perfusion, anaesthesia technicians & biomedical engineers.

The program has been well-received by professions from India and across the world (23 countries). To ensure that the quality of education and concepts meted out is maintained to the highest standard, faculty who excel in their subspecialties (documented by peer respect, publications, experience & interest for teaching) were invited to take part in the program.

To befit the experience, the series was aptly nomenclated as the 'MASTERCLASS' series under the ambit of the Resident Academic Forum of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons. A total of 244 webinars were conducted & aired in the duration between (including limits)

3rd March 2020 and 4th October 2020. The series ran back-to-back on a daily basis (with an average of 3 sessions) up till 31st May 2020. Thereon it has broadcasted 4 webinars every weekend.

Dr. Ali Zamir Khan kindly consented to ally and organise his classes to benefit the attendes on matters concerning thoracic diseases and surgery. Dr. John has trained 70 post-doctoral trainees, who are today heading some of the most successful programs across the world. His meticulous approach to clinical practice, compassionate attitude towards his patients and unflinching guidance towards education are hallmarks of an academic cardiothoracic surgeon till date.

His stellar work in the treatment of juvenile mitral stenosis, adult congenital cardiac disease (particularly tetralogy of Fallot) are noteworthy and considered examples of exemplary clinical practice and has set the foray for practice even today. His selfless and stellar practice can be seen in the words of numerous publications of repute. Indeed Dr. John's contributions hitherto brought Ida Scudder's vision of providing compassionate, quality care for all regardless of religion or social standing.

In recognition of his extraordinary services to society through the alleys of Medicine, the Government of India bestowed on him, the Padma Shri in 1975. Dr. John is receipt of numerous awards and accolades, perhaps none to keep up with the satisfaction he received through the gratitude and smile of thousands whom he had the privilege of being service to.

He served the Association as its 13th President between 1981 and 1982.

In view of the present situation across the nation as a consequence of COVID-19, the Executive Committee of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic surgeons has come to the conclusion of hosting the **67th Annual Conference (2021)** in a virtual format online.

Consequently, the scheduled annual conference in Jaipur will follow a year later. It shall be henceforth referred to as the **68th Annual Conference** of the IACTS (IACTSCON 2022).
