I request every member update your member profiles immediately, if you haven't done so already.



A Roundup of Recent Events

IACTS Thoracic CME 2022



The Thoracic CME of the Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons (IACTS) was held at the National Institute of Tuberculosis and Respiratory Diseases (NITRD), New Delhi, on 17th and 18th December 2022.

The Organising Chairman for the meeting was Dr. Ravindra Kumar Dewan, Director NITRD, Organising Secretary Dr. Pallavi Purwar, Assistant Professor CTVS, VMMC and Safdarjung Hospital, and Joint Organising Secretary Dr. Saaransh Bansal, Specialist Grade II NITRD. A local Scientific Organising Committee comprising thoracic surgeons from all the major Institutions of Delhi-NCR were involved in planning the event.

Several faculty members in the departments of chest, microbiology, pathology and radiology contributed towards making this event a huge success. Subject experts from all over the country as well as overseas shared the latest insights both from published literature and personal experiences. The 12-hour long scientific deliberations covered areas such as chest wall (trauma, congenital abnormalities and surgical techniques for reconstruction), mediastinum (Thymus, posterior mediastinal masses and surgical techniques), lung infections (TB, COVID, hydatid, post tuberculosis sequelae and their surgical

procedures including both older techniques and latest surgical advances), non infectious lung diseases (COPD, bullous lung diseases), video-assisted thoracic surgery (VATS) (basics to complex procedures), empyema (early, late as well as complex empyema and various surgical procedures to address these issues), lung cancer (staging, case selection, stage-wise surgical management as well as recent advances and newer management strategies and controversies), congenital lung diseases, tracheal resections and reconstruction, chylothorax, intercostal drains, postoperative care and complications following lung surgery.

The scientific deliberations were interactive and well-appreciated by senior faculty members, early career faculty as well as cardiothoracic surgeons from all across the country. The programme had nearly 160 participants present physically and several joining the deliberations virtually. A unique quiz was conducted on Day 1 with participants from Kerala, Karnataka as well as Delhi NCR. The clinical-based questions with representative imaging provided a unique opportunity for experts as well as students to discuss possible approaches to management of cases that are dealt with routinely by thoracic surgeons across the country. The discussions provided a unique opportunity for participants, hosts, judges as well as delegates to learn together.



The Chief Guest for the 2-day scientific programme was Mr. Rajesh Bhushan, Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. The Guest of Honour was Dr Minu Bajpai, Executive Director, National Board of Examinations.

An important session of the CME is the prestigious RC Jain Oration held every year. Dr R C Jain, an eminent thoracic surgeon, was the founder director of NITRD. By his painstaking efforts, in 1991, the Institute was declared autonomous under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India. Dr. Jain was largely instrumental in building the basic foundational vision of the Institute as a center of tertiary care in respiratory diseases. The RC Jain Oration is a recognition and celebration of his contributions to cardiothoracic surgery.

The RC Jain Oration 2022 was presented by awardee Dr Bhabatosh Biswas. Dr. Biswas was felicitated by the Chief Guest in the presence of IACTS President Dr Z S Meharwal, Secretary Dr C S Hiremath, senior IACTS members, and eminent thoracic surgeons like Dr Rajan Santosham, and host Dr Ravindra Kumar Dewan, Director NITRD.

At the end of the CME, feedback from the attendees was sought. Several congratulated the IACTS as a body for offering opportunity to young dynamic thoracic as well as cardiothoracic surgeons to both participate and learn at this prestigious event. Secretary Dr. Hiremath congratulated Team NITRD for a well-conducted CME.

Obituaries

The Indian Association of Cardiovascular-Thoracic Surgeons mourns the passing away of the following members of our fraternity. They will be remembered and missed for their service to humankind through the practice of cardiothoracic surgery. We pray for the bereaved to find the strength to cope with their loss.

Dr. Ashok Shetty

Dr Ashok Bhojaraj Shetty, Cardio-thoracic & Vascular Surgeon in Mangalore, Karnataka lost the battle with colonic malignancy and passed away on 10th August, 2022 at the age of 66. A native of Kaup in Udupi district of Karnataka, Dr Ashok Shetty graduated in Medicine from Karnatak Medical College, Hubli and secured his M.S. in General Surgery from the same institution. He did his M.Ch in CTVS from Kasturba Medical College, Manipal studying under Professor P. Shatapathy. Thereafter, he travelled to England where he trained for 4 years. On his return, he joined Kasturba Medical College, Mangalore and served there from 1994 till his demise in 2022, as Consultant and rising to the post of Professor. He was a versatile surgeon skilled in Cardiac, General Thoracic as well as Vascular surgery. A soft spoken man, he was a keen photographer and billiards player. He leaves behind his wife Dr Meenaxi, a Physician, 2 children and a granddaughter, a legion of grateful and disconsolate patients and a void that will be difficult to fill.

Dr. Krishna Manohar

As an undergraduate, Krishna Manohar was curious about the empty Sree Chitra Tirunal Medical Centre which he passed every day on his way to the Trivandrum Medical College and the sudden stirrings in the silent building. When he learnt that the Medical Centre was being recast as a super speciality Centre his curiosity turned into dreams of the day he would enter its portals and emerge as a super specialist in cardiac surgery. Sugar plums danced in his head to the amusement of friends! The dream however came true and Manohar completed the residency requirements, passed the examinations and obtained the coveted M.Ch degree in 1988 from Sree Chitra Institute. He faced no obstacles in the highly competitive entrance examination, demanding years of residency or the tough examination for M.Ch. He carried his knowledge and teaching skills lightly and was ever ready to assist fellow students in addressing their academic and even personal difficulties. He was among the few students who took interest



in the ongoing project on developing the Chitra heart valve and became the first assistant in the historic implantation of the Chitra valve in a human patient in December, 1990. It was typical of him to earn the grateful friendship of the first patient, Murali of Thrissur and turn his yearly "follow-up" into a celebrant reunion of the patient and the team who carried out the operation even 32 years later. Patients, nurses, doctors, students and non-teaching staff respected and loved him for not only his superb surgical competence but also for his simplicity and cheerful readiness to help.

As his interest in paediatric cardiac surgery became passionate he proceeded to Chennai where he spent the initial two years in the Madras Medical Mission with his friend and reputed surgeon Dr Kurien followed by several years in Dr KM Cherian's Heart Institute under the guidance of Dr Cherian himself.

Though we were scattered hither and thither after our Chitra years, the hand of destiny brought us together again in 2014. The newly set up Sri Sathya Sai Sanjeevani Hospital (SSSH) in New Raipur was a pioneering initiative taken by the Trust beyond South India under the leadership of Mr C Sreenivas. He asked me to visit the hospital and discuss the possibilities for fresh approaches in patient care and research. As the capital of a new state, New Raipur had attracted many new institutions including AIIMS and Apollo Hospital, which were much larger than SSS hospitals. Sreenivas was concerned about the viability of the infant institute in terms of the availability of faculty and even patients. We discussed these issues inconclusively that evening. Then I remembered a



powerful exhortation of Bhagawan Sathya Sai Baba many years earlier to a small group including Dr RM Varma of NIMHANS, Mr Ramakrishna of L&T and myself to build hospitals for children with congenital anomalies of the heart. He knew these anomalies were correctable by surgery which would restore a normal life span for the unfortunate children. It was their birth right and doctors were obliged to help them. Money is not the problem, what is in short supply is compassion, Baba admonished.

I shared these remarks with Sreenivas and we hit upon a new idea – SSSH at New Raipur as a hospital exclusively for children with heart disease. It would be unique in India and a boon for needy children. We were delighted but wondered whether the hospital could get a competent surgeon who would limit himself to cardiac surgery in children. We didn't have to wait long as the name of Krishna Manohar who was in Chennai flashed through our minds. He would be our man of destiny at SSSH in New Raipur and would provide leadership in making it a hospital for children with heart disease. Fortunately, Manohar accepted the offer and quickly put together a compact team of himself, a cardiologist, anaesthetist, and a Nurse Supervisor for the operating rooms. Open heart surgery on a regular basis for the correction of complex cardiac anomalies in children including infants began within weeks. The excellent results and no billing for services were hailed by a grateful public. This model drew the attention of neighbouring states, which invited SSSH to replicate similar institutions in Palwal (Haryana) and Kharghar (Maharashtra). In a decade ending in November 2022, the three SSS hospitals carried out over 22000 open heart and intervention procedures, the great majority for complex heart anomalies, with excellent results.

Manohar's leadership in setting up a highly successful programme in New Raipur for the correction of congenital heart anomalies and its replication in Palwal and Kharghar evoked admiration and disbelief! His interest in heart surgery in children sprouted in Chitra, grew in Dr Cherian's hospital and shot up into a majestic tree with rapid ramifications in New Raipur. His leadership potential suddenly found full expression in the SSS family, which became his single-minded mission. The monthly statistics of the major procedures done in SSS hospitals with excellent results, more hospitals in the pipeline, and the speed of progress are astonishing.

The spread of cardiac hospitals for children is an idea whose time has come. The spread continues and seems unstoppable as people become aware that children with congenital anomalies of the heart can be restored to good health and normal lifespan by surgery. Krishna Manohar was a pioneer in this restorative mission with thorough professional knowledge matched by masterly skill. Above all, he was an embodiment of goodness who, in Bhatrihari's words, enshrine goodness in heart, word and deeds; please the three worlds by doing good to others; extol even a particle of good qualities in others and find consummate happiness in their heart of hearts.

It is a sad privilege to pay homage to my student, colleague, and dear friend, Krishna Manohar.
